<u>Sequence of Events</u> - order in which events take place

<u>Summarizing</u>- to retell main ideas in your own words

Decoding - Base words may have prefixes or suffixes. These can form a new syllable. -ing, -ed, and -es are examples. Remember that base words spelling may change when an ending is added.

- a final "e" may be dropped (guide becomes guiding)
- a final 'y" is changed to an "i" (bury becomes buries)
- a final consonant is doubled (spot becomes spotted)
